

Hello, wonderful Mathews Community! Happy April to all of you. I find spring to be both beautiful and hectic as the weather warms up and the activity calendar fills up quickly! When our lives get so busy, finding the time to do everything that needs to be done can often be a challenge. This is why I'd like to spend some time on the importance of keeping daily reading in your schedule for your children and for yourselves.

Reading for as little as 20 minutes every day makes a huge difference in the lives of our students. The illustration on the right was shared by Cynthia Miller, one of our first grade parents. It clearly shows the research behind the value of daily reading. It is a compelling argument for continuing to carve out at least 20 minutes for reading each day, even when our schedules get busy.


Think about how much more knowledge and vocabulary our children are exposed to when they read. Having a strong vocabulary is essential for our students as they are exposed to new material and learning throughout their educational career. Imagine how this exposure through reading can help them We know that students who throughout their lives. read like "James" in the infographic have higher academic achievement than students who read like "Travis" - up to 80% higher achievement. That's huge! Many adults sometimes give up the habit of daily reading but consider how much we teach our kids when we read and think about the knowledge we too could learn in 20 minutes a day!

It's important that we model reading for our children. Talk about books you're reading or an interesting magazine or newspaper article you read. Ask your children about their own books. Sit down and read a comic or a picture book or a chapter in a novel with your children. Not only is this beautiful bonding time, but it also shows your commitment to reading each day.

Access to books and to print is incredibly important for our students. All children who have early

access to books and print in the home, who are read to and who read daily, become better readers. So how can you surround your child with books? The library, both the one at Mathews and the public ones are marvelous treasure troves of books. It's easy to get a card and start checking out all kinds of books – even electronic ones! Good Reads, Half-Price Books, and Goodwill are also inexpensive places to find interesting books. Happy reading, everybody!


