Hello wonderful Mathews Community! Happy March to everyone! And, while we're still waiting for the flowers, our students are blooming and growing every day. It's a wonderful thing.

Speaking of growing, the staff and I are committed to our own ongoing improvement and learning by studying the book, Opening Minds: Using Language to Change Lives by Peter Johnson. The focus for the book is on the words we use in the classroom with students as they're learning and how we can deliberately create environments that foster a growth mindset and resilience for our kiddos. This dovetails nicely with the emphasis we've had all year about reframing the concept of failure from a negative to a positive. Our mistakes help us grow. When we're not afraid to take risks, our learning expands. At Mathews we want to strive to use words that help our students develop in all areas of growth.

An example of deliberately choosing our words is the use of "yet." Instead of saying, "You / I don't know how to read," say, "You / I don't know how to read, yet." The simple addition of that one little word changes the frame for the child and encourages learning rather than shutting it down. I've written before about this growth mindset and how essential it is for our students as it helps them push through difficult tasks and find the fun in learning. When we help our students see their potential, we are truly helping them blossom and grow. And remember, this hope for their future is a strong predictor for future success! At school, the staff and I talk about being like the willow tree, able to bend and adapt to strong winds and storms. This is the same adaptability we want to nurture in our students too.

So how can you help at home? When your child is learning a new skill or struggling with a homework assignment, use words that encourage and foster growth. Model what happens when you get distracted while working on a task. Talk about the lessons you've acquired from your life when things were hard or when you made a mistake and learned from it. Together we can support each and every child along his or her educational journey. Happy growing, everyone!
