I want to talk a bit about resilience and hope for our students. The Gallup Group is conducting research on some of the "soft" skills necessary for success in school and beyond and have found that hope is actually a better predictor of success in college than test scores. Let me say that again - the amount of hope a child feels is a better predictor of college success than test scores. This a pretty powerful statement and one to which we need to pay attention. Stanford University has even started a Resiliency Project to help their students recognize the importance of learning from their mistakes.


We know that learning new skills and concepts requires brain power and sometimes that hard work isn't enjoyable. We also know that pushing through those difficult times is rewarding and that mastering new ideas often becomes fun. We sincerely hope your child is growing academically and socially and finding the fun in success at school.

This year, the Mathews teachers and staff are committed to helping our children become resilient We want to foster in them a sense of confidence in their own abilities to master new ideas and concepts - not because it's easy but because they were

able to dig down deep and work through any challenges. We are having deliberate conversations with each other and our students about mistakes and "failure" and reframing these terms in a more positive light. Mistakes become data. Analyzing the data helps us figure out a better way to solve the problem, edit our writing, conduct a better experiment. One of our teachers makes a point of finding the best mistake made in class each day. Why? Because we learn the most from the mistakes, or as we like to refer to them, the prototypes we make. When our children realize they can grow from their mistakes, that they can become better learners, they build confidence in themselves as problem-solvers. This confidence then gives them hope in the knowledge that they have the skills necessary to push through difficulty and forge ahead.

Children are naturally risk takers. We want to make sure we're not squashing their willingness to take risks with academic learning. So, at Mathews, we'll continue to focus on creating safe spaces to ask questions, to make mistakes, and to grow as students and scholars. We'll continue to encourage our students to push through difficult challenges. And we'll continue to learn more about how to foster resilience and hope in our children and ourselves. How can you help your child become more resilient and grow hope? Encourage your child to try new things and experience safe challenges. Even when it seems the questions are never ending, allow them to explore their curiosity and cheer them on when they struggle.

Let's build that hope together!

Lots of lovely sounds are happening in music class! The Kinder students are looking for and using "found" instruments (think car keys and wooden kitchen spoons).

Ist Grade is listening for one and two sound rhythm patterns in music. There are so many singing games and poems that use one and two sounds!

The 2nd through 5th grade classes are expanding their melodic vocabulary, using songs that add new pitches for each grade (2nd – do, 3rd – combining mi re do patterns with so and la, 4th – reaching for high do, 5th – major scale).

#### COMPUTER LAB CLICKS


In the lab we are focusing our attention on "Cyber Safety", "Cyber Bullying", and Keyboarding.
